Annual Indigenous Veterans Remembrance Day Service at FNUniv Regina Campus

Regina, Saskatchewan – The First Nations University of Canada, Regina Campus, is hosting the annual Indigenous Veterans Remembrance Day Service on Thursday, November 10, 2022, at 10:30 a.m. A pipe ceremony is scheduled at 9:00 a.m. National Indigenous Veterans Day was November 8th and we recognize the sacrifices and service and pay our respects to all Indigenous veterans across the country.

The Indigenous Veterans Remembrance Day Service has been an annual event for FNUniv. During the pandemic, FNUniv put the event on hold until 2021, when we hosted the inaugural flag-raising ceremony for the Regina Campus flags, followed by the Service. Invited representatives from the Saskatchewan First Nations Veterans Association (SFNVA), the RCMP, the Regina Police Service and other military members will be in attendance. We value their presence and respect the service they have given to the country in the past and present.

The Indigenous Veterans Remembrance Day Service is held in the First Nations Veterans Memorial Tipi, which is a tribute to First Nations Veterans who served in the Canadian and U.S. militaries since World War I.

Everyone is welcome to attend. The event will also be live streamed on the FNUniv Facebook page for anyone who cannot attend in person. The grand entry of all dignitaries and veterans will commence at 10:30 a.m. Drum group, Eagle Claw Singers, will sing "Soldier Boy," a well-known honour song for Veterans. Singing O'Canada in the Cree language is Evelyn Maxie-Poitras, a Regina high-school student from White Bear First Nation.
